
In this month's newsletter is information for registering to vote in the State of Arizona. I know some people choose not to vote; however, remember we as Native Americans were denied the right to vote for so long. If you choose to register, there is a printed application as well as a website to register on-line.

There has been much discussion on the CARES Treasury funds the Tribe has received. A letter will be sent outlining Tribal Council's working meeting discussion. A Special Meeting will be held on Monday, July 6, 2020 for Tribal Council to make some decisions. This will be available to be heard using zoom. A link will be provided on our Tribal Website.

As you have seen with the last per capita payment it was not what we normally would have received. We did not receive the full payments for our transfer agreements. It is expected the 2nd quarter per capita payment (July 30, 2020) will be affected by the casino closures as well. Included in this newsletter is a letter explaining the per capita payments; I am told not all received this.

Our IT department has been tasked with creating a TRIBAL MEMBER ONLY portal for our tribal website. We hope to have this up and running by the 6th of July. This is where we will post information for Tribal Member only.

With the decision of the Tribal Council to move to Level 1 in our community I want to let the people know it was not an easy decision as the vote was 3-2. We have been given the education and supplies to help protect us as we make our decision to leave our homes. Remain vigilant and be mindful of others around you.

How the Census Benefits Your Community

Federal funds, grants and support to states, counties and communities are based on population totals and breakdowns by sex, age, race and other factors. Your community benefits the most when the census counts everyone. When you respond to the census, you help your community get its fair share of the more than \$675 billion per year in federal funds spent on schools, hospitals, roads, public works and other vital programs.

Businesses use census data to decide where to build factories, offices and stores, and this creates jobs. Developers use the census to build new homes and revitalize old neighborhoods. Local governments use the census for public safety and emergency preparedness. Residents use the census to support community initiatives involving legislation, quality-of-life and consumer advocacy.

FDA advises consumers not to use hand sanitizer products manufactured by Eskbiochem

[6/19/2020] FDA advises consumers not to use any hand sanitizer manufactured by Eskbiochem SA de CV in Mexico, due to the potential presence of methanol (wood alcohol), a substance that can be toxic when absorbed through the skin or ingested. FDA has identified the following products manufactured by Eskbiochem:

- All-Clean Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-002-01)
- Esk Biochem Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-007-01)
- CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 75% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-008-04)
- Lavar 70 Gel Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-006-01)
- The Good Gel Antibacterial Gel Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-010-10)
- CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 80% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-005-03)
- CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 75% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-009-01)
- CleanCare NoGerm Advanced Hand Sanitizer 80% Alcohol (NDC: 74589-003-01)
- Saniderm Advanced Hand Sanitizer (NDC: 74589-001-01)

FDA tested samples of Lavar Gel and CleanCare No Germ. Lavar Gel contains 81 percent (v/v) methanol and no ethyl alcohol, and CleanCare No Germ contains 28 percent (v/v) methanol. Methanol is not an acceptable ingredient for hand sanitizers and should not be used due to its toxic effects.

Consumers who have been exposed to hand sanitizer containing methanol should seek immediate treatment, which is critical for potential reversal of toxic effects of methanol poisoning. Substantial methanol exposure can result in nausea, vomiting, headache, blurred vision, permanent blindness, seizures, coma, permanent damage to the nervous system or death. Although all persons using these products on their hands are at risk, young children who accidentally ingest these products and adolescents and adults who drink these products as an alcohol (ethanol) substitute, are most at risk for methanol poisoning.

On June 17, 2020, FDA contacted Eskbiochem to recommend the company remove its hand sanitizer products from the market due to the risks associated with methanol poisoning. To date, the company has not taken action to remove these potentially dangerous products from the market. Therefore, FDA recommends consumers stop using these hand sanitizers and dispose of them immediately in appropriate hazardous waste containers. Do not flush or pour these products down the drain.

FDA reminds consumers to wash their hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after coughing, sneezing, or blowing one's nose. If soap and water are not readily available, the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention](#) (CDC) recommend consumers use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent ethanol.

FDA remains vigilant and will continue to take action when quality issues arise with hand sanitizers. Additionally, the agency is concerned with false and misleading claims for hand sanitizers, for

example that they can provide prolonged protection such as 24-hours against viruses including COVID-19, since there is no evidence to support these claims.

To date, FDA is not aware of any reports of adverse events associated with these hand sanitizer products. FDA encourages health care professionals, consumers and patients to report adverse events or quality problems experienced with the use of hand sanitizers to FDA's [MedWatch Adverse Event Reporting](#) program:

Hand Sanitizer Use Out and About



GermS are everywhere! They can get onto hands and items we touch during daily activities and make us sick. Cleaning hands at key times with soap and water or hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol is one of the most important steps you can take to avoid getting sick and spreading germs to those around you.

There are important differences between washing hands with soap and water and using hand sanitizer. Soap and water work to remove all types of germs from

hands, while sanitizer acts by killing certain germs on the skin. Although alcohol-based hand sanitizers can quickly reduce the number of germs in many situations, they should be used in the right situations. Soap and water are more effective than hand sanitizers at removing certain kinds of germs like [norovirus](#), [Cryptosporidium](#), and [Clostridioides difficile](#), as well as chemicals.

Hand sanitizers also may not remove harmful chemicals, such as pesticides and heavy metals like lead.

Handwashing reduces the amounts of all types of germs, pesticides, and metals on hands. Knowing when to clean your hands and which method to use will give you the best chance of preventing sickness.

When should I use?

Soap and Water

- **Before, during, and after** preparing food
- **Before** eating food
- **Before** and **after** caring for someone who is sick with vomiting or diarrhea
- **Before** and **after** treating a cut or wound
- **After** using the toilet
- **After** [changing diapers, or cleaning up a child who has used the bathroom](#)
- **After** touching an animal, animal feed, or animal waste
- **After** handling pet food or pet treats
- **After** touching garbage
- If your hands are visibly dirty or greasy

Alcohol-based Hand Sanitizer

- **Before** and **after** visiting a friend or loved one in a hospital or nursing home, unless the person is sick with *Clostridioides difficile* (if so, use soap and water to wash hands).
- If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains **at least 60% alcohol**, and wash with soap and water as soon as you can.

DO NOT use hand sanitizer if your hands are visibly dirty or greasy—for example, after gardening, playing outdoors, fishing, or camping. If a handwashing station is available, wash your hands with soap and water instead.

After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing, you should clean your hands by immediately washing your hands with soap or using alcohol-based hand sanitizer to avoid spreading germs.

How should I use?

Soap and Water

- **Wet** your hands with clean running water (warm or cold), turn off the tap, and apply soap.
- **Lather** your hands by rubbing them together with the soap. Lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.
- **Scrub** your hands for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song twice.
- **Rinse** your hands under clean, running water.
- **Dry** your hands using a clean towel or air dry them.

Alcohol-based Hand Sanitizer

Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains **at least 60% alcohol**. Supervise young children when they use hand sanitizer to prevent swallowing alcohol, especially in schools and childcare facilities.

- **Put** enough sanitizer on your hands to cover all surfaces.
- **Rub** your hands together until they feel dry (this should take around 20 seconds).

Do NOT rinse or wipe off the hand sanitizer before it's dry; it may not work well against germs.

Hunting may change due to COVID19 - if we are still in Stage 2, we may have to limit hunting to Tribal Members living on/off the Reservation and some other Covid19 rules. Which we will put in the smoke signals when the committee comes up with the rules. We will always remember the words Pandemic, social distancing, COVID 19, Quarantine, Masks, hands washing. So remember to stay safe.

Watch out for DEER on the road - slow down between the store and Moccasin, if one crosses in front of you, there are more behind it, and sometimes they will run into the side of the Vehicle. All Car/Deer accidents need to be reported to Mohave County Sheriff, BIA Police or this Department, this is in the Wildlife Ordinance and in Arizona state law.

Snakes, Spiders, and Scorpions – Are out, so watch out for them.

Fishing – All Tribal Members need a permit at no cost, so come in and get one for the 2020 season, all others cost is \$10 dollars for the first day, and remember to pick up your trash. Children need to be with someone 18 years or older while fishing and only tribal member can swim in the pond. Call my cell phone on weekend or whenever you need a permit.

Minors Hunters Safety Card – On the internet go to hunter-ed.com – Everyone one 10 to 18 needs to attend a hunter's safety course. The child will need one to get a hunting permit. This is not something new it has been in the Ordinance since the beginning. It is better to get a Hunters Safety card in the state you live in so you can participate in there State hunts.

Fire Wood – Tribal Members you don't need a permit to get fire wood, unless you are selling it off the Reservation. But, to get wood for personal use or for a Tribal Member, you don't need a permit. You can get wood anywhere on the reservation, as long as it is not green, greenwood will burn slow and will plug up your chimney faster.

Back Dirt Roads – If for some reason you take the back roads, beware of the snow, sand, and mud, remember to tell someone where you are going and about what time you will return, take a lot of water, some snacks, matches, and bring a shovel, tow chain, and a jack (Handyman), Cell phone may or may not work, Text messaging may work better, and pick up all litter, **KEEP MAIN GATES CLOSED!!!**, if the road gets snowy, sandy or muddy turn back you don't want to get stuck. If you know of someone that has gone out and not returned call this Department at any time, (office or Home) contact any Wildlife Committee member, or BIA-Police. This will only be to get them home, but if asked to be pulled you out, you may be charged a fee.

For those who don't know me, my name is Judith Martinez. I've been residing on the reservation for seven years. I live with my fiancé and our son who is one year old.





In my road construction career I have visited/observed many reservation cemeteries in Arizona, Utah and Nevada, **never** seen one quite atrocious as ours. I have no words for the condition of our neglected boot hill.

During the 1990's I proudly informed the Tribal Council that I was told that our Tribe had a clean reservation in comparison to others. But, in recent years that's not so true. There are weeds growing abundant & trash scattered in our villages. This is a problem I would think. Kudo's to those of you that care for your loved one's last place of rest and keeping up with your yards.

My last words is: If you have nothing to do this summer, fall, and winter let's beautify our cemetery and reservation.

VOTER REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Use this form to register to vote in Arizona or update your voter registration. You must update your registration whenever you move, change your name, or change your political party affiliation. Call your County Recorder's office (listed below) with any questions about voter registration.

TO REGISTER TO VOTE IN ARIZONA YOU MUST BE:

- A **U.S. citizen** (proof of citizenship required to vote a "full ballot")
- A **resident** of Arizona and the county listed on your registration
- **18 years** of age or more by the next regular General Election

YOU CANNOT REGISTER TO VOTE IN ARIZONA IF:

- You have been found mentally **incapacitated** by a court and your voting rights were not preserved; or
- You have been convicted of a **felony** and have not had your civil rights restored. Civil rights are automatically restored if you have only one felony conviction, completed your sentence, parole, or probation, and paid any victim restitution.

You **can** register to vote if you have only misdemeanor convictions or you are in pretrial detention and are otherwise eligible.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- Register **online** at www.servicearizona.com, or **mail** or **take** your completed, signed form to your County Recorder (acceptable mailing addresses provided below) or person designated to receive registration forms. Keep this copy as your receipt. The County Recorder will send you a confirmation of registration within 4-6 weeks.
- Fill in your political party preference in Box 14. If you leave this box blank as a first-time registrant, your party will be none or "No Party Designated." If you are already registered and you leave this box blank, you will keep your prior party preference. If you pick "Other," write the full name of your preferred party on the line provided.

REGISTRATION DEADLINE

- You must register at least **29 days before the election** (or the next business day if that deadline falls on a holiday) to vote in that election.
- If returned by mail, the registration must be: (1) postmarked by the deadline and received by the County Recorder by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day; or (2) dated on or before the deadline and received by the County Recorder no later than 5 days after the deadline.

PROOF OF CITIZENSHIP REQUIREMENT

To be eligible to vote a "full ballot," you must submit proof of citizenship with your registration form or by 5:00 p.m. on the Thursday before Election Day. A "full ballot" includes all federal, state, county, and local races and ballot questions for which you are eligible to vote.

If you do not submit proof of citizenship and we cannot acquire your proof of citizenship from the Arizona Motor Vehicle Division or the statewide voter registration database, you will receive a "federal-only" ballot, which has only federal races and no state, county, or local races or initiatives/referendums.

You don't need to resubmit proof of citizenship if you previously registered to vote in Arizona and submitted citizenship proof, and are using this form to update your name, party affiliation, or address after moving within the state.

VALID FORMS OF PROOF OF CITIZENSHIP

If you have an **Arizona driver's license** or **non-operating license** issued after October 1, 1996, write the number in Box 9. This will serve as proof of citizenship and no additional documents are needed. However, if your license was issued when you were not a U.S. citizen but you later became a U.S. citizen, complete Box 11 or provide another form of proof of citizenship.

Other acceptable proof of citizenship (only one is needed):

- Legible copy of a birth certificate that verifies citizenship. If the name on the birth certificate is not the same as your current legal name, submit supporting documents (e.g. marriage certificate).
- Legible copy of the pertinent pages of your passport
- Presentation to the County Recorder of U.S. naturalization documents, or Alien Registration Number, Naturalization Certificate Number, or Citizenship Certificate Number (Box 11)
- Indian Census Number, Bureau of Indian Affairs Number, Tribal Treaty Card Number, or Tribal Enrollment Number (Box 10)
- Legible copy of your Tribal Certificate of Indian Blood or Tribal or Bureau of Indian Affairs Affidavit of Birth

PUBLIC NOTICE OF EXCLUSIONS

**To all persons residing on or remaining on the
Kaibab Indian Reservation:**

After proper notice and hearing the following individuals have been excluded and/or banished from the Kaibab Indian Reservation pursuant to the Tribe's Exclusion Ordinance:

- Monique Carlson
- Arthur Leo Cisneros
- Carol Pikyavit Franklin
- Jolita Lopez
- Jerome Bushhead
- Malik Drye
- Nolan Fisher
- Ashley Rogers

What this means for you:

Per the Tribe's Exclusion Ordinance, unauthorized entry onto Tribal land (§ 1101(f)) and aiding and abetting criminal activities (§ 1101(x)) are grounds for exclusion/banishment.

Assisting any of these individuals in unauthorized entry onto Tribal lands or helping them remain on the Reservation will subject you to Tribal exclusion/banishment proceedings.

If you help them violate the Exclusion Order you can be excluded or banished from the Reservation temporarily or permanently, in addition to any criminal prosecution you may face.

The Tribe's Exclusion Ordinance was enacted under Article VI, Section 1 (d), (h), and (j), and Article IV, Sections 1(a) and (h) of the Tribal Constitution, and the inherent sovereign authority of the Tribe. The Exclusion Ordinance is a Tribal law meant to protect the Reservation, and the health and safety of all Reservation residents within the jurisdiction of the Kaibab Paiute Tribe. By this notice, the Tribal Council intends to achieve the objectives of the Kaibab Constitution—to strengthen the governing structure of the tribal government, protect and conserve tribal property and resources, administer justice, and promote the welfare of Tribal members.


